Pasta Sauce Takes Center Stage in Olympia

Yes, the Chili CookOff dates to when Lorna & Seely Moore introduced us to the idea many, many years back. We've had great locations and numerous wonderful chili recipes to sample throughout the years.



This year, our hosts, Fred Wright and Kathy Lombardo welcomed us all with a couple types of pasta and prizes for the winners. The crowd arrived, bringing around 11 cars... which included the Nuxoll's in their Spider 2000 with the rare hard top installed.

Inside the conversations were good, but the sauces were better. I made my way around sampling every offering, and even had seconds on a few using an alternate pasta to see how it effected the flavor. Better lineage and perhaps it would have worked, but switching pasta types didn't make a difference for my taste buds.

Each of us could cast a single 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place vote. Then Fred & Kathy's accounting team tallied up the numbers. In the end, all were very good but the winner was Gordy Hyde and his Amatriciana alla Bucatini.

Nicely done Gordy and a well deserved win!

Here is the winning recipe!

• 6 oz. guanciale or pancetta, or if you cannot find those bacon (preferably un-smoked)

- 29 oz. can stewed tomatoes
- 3 garlic cloves, finely minced
- 1/2 red onion, finely chopped

• 1/2 t. crushed red pepper flakes (or less, according to taste)

• ¼ c. red wine (careful...lowers tomato flavor) Dice the pork finely (1/4" cubes) and sauté. Add onion, continue to sauté until soft. Add garlic and briefly sauté. (If using bacon, and it is not very lean, you may want to drain some of the drippings.) Meanwhile, drain the stewed tomatoes and put the remaining tomatoes in a blender and whirl for a few seconds. Add to the sautéed mixture and allow to cook down. If using wine, you will obviously add more time. Typically served with bucatini pasta which should be cooked a minute or two less than directions on the package. Add the nearly cooked pasta to the sauce for a couple of minutes to allow it to finish and soak up some of the juiciness of the sauce.

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Miniature Alfa Updates!



I've mentioned Matchbox before, and the red version of the Alfa Romeo 4C has been out for a while. They are hard to find, but now they have another version to watch for... a dark grey color as well. I check for these in every store that sells toys, like Fred Meyer, Target, etc...

Speaking of Alfa 4C... AutoArt always does a wonderful job on their 1:18 scale cars. The owner of the company has a passion for Alfa Romeo and Lotus in his personal car collection and it shows in the many miniatures he chooses to make. They just released a new Alfa Romeo 4C and again, it has European trim. The doors and engine cover open to show off great detail. The car looks wonderful and well worth the \$200 it sells for.

There are a number of great miniatures available these days. Even cars that have been mostly ignored to date. For example, the Alfa Romeo 164 sedan.

Now, the folks at Laudroracing Models Sarl in France have created a nice 1:18 scale 164S for us. It has great proportions and trim, but no opening doors or hood. They modeled it to match the European look so it has the optional wheels and is missing the rear wing. The model sells for just over \$100 counting slow shipping.



Lastly, I saw that a few companies are taking pre-orders for both 1:18 scale and 1:43 scale versions of the wonderful new Giulia Quadrifoglio sedan. I look forward to seeing how these look in the near future.

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Club Meeting Wraps Up Safely

Looking to my left for on-coming traffic and seeing none, I made a right-hand turn into the first lane. Instantly, I heard a blaring horn and saw a Jeep bearing down hard upon my Baja in the rearview mirror. The driver quickly swerved into the left lane and barely missed my vehicle.

The driver in the Jeep kept honking and threw an assault of unkind words my way as he drove up next to me. I realized he was yelling at me to pull over so he could beat me up. I thought pulling over wasn't the safest idea so I mouthed, "I'm sorry," and simply slowed down. I was grateful he sped away leaving me only with the one-finger salute.

Still shaking, I turned to my 13-year-old son and said, "Where did that driver come from? I looked carefully and saw no one. How did I miss him?" Ten years later, at last month's NWARC meeting, I discovered what might have happened.

Our guest speakers at our February NWARC meeting were Mi Ae Lipe and Mark Butcher. The two friends gave a presentation on street driving safety and shared tips and insights more sophisticated than the information any of us in the United States received from our driver's training programs...ever.

Opening with facts about the design of the human eye, Mi Ae talked about how the center of the retina generates highresolution images but the rest of the retina, our peripheral vision, does not and, instead, is designed to pick up motion. This design enabled our primitive ancestors to notice quickly approaching animals out the corner of their eyes and be prepared before the animal attacked. But there are problems to this design for humans who drive fast moving vehicles. Mi Ae says, "vehicles traveling at a constant speed will stay in the same position relative to each other as they approach a point of collision." Without any difference in speed between the two vehicles, a driver's peripheral vision may not detect the other moving car and, thus collide with it.

Mi Ae also pointed out that when people glance across a scene, the human eye jumps and pauses to take a 'snapshot' of the scene and doesn't capture everything. Therefore, if something like a bike or motorcycle is present between these eye snapshots, drivers who look around may not see them. She also claims the faster you move your head, the farther your eye jumps across a scene and you are more likely to miss something right in front of you. This may explain why I didn't see the Jeep. Perhaps, I moved my head too quickly when looking back. This, of course, would never hold up as a defense in court, but it would explain my situation.

With his native British accent, Mark Butcher shared some pointers about the safest way to drive around a blind corner. He explained that when approaching a blind turn, drivers should stay wide in their lane so they and any approaching traffic can see each other sooner. Next, drivers should slow down enough so they could stop at the furthest visual point in the road. Then they should match their speed to the speed of the furthest visual point as it moves away from them. Mark admitted it wasn't the fastest way through a curve, but it was the safest.

At the end of the meeting, I chatted with veteran Alfisti who said they took with them at least one or two new ideas to implement while street driving. As for me, I learned to look more slowly to the left and right before turning and now focus the center of my retina on more of my surroundings while driving. *Words by Cindy Akana*
