play garden. Now we can identify native plants growing in the wild. The group then walked through the Rose Garden with a hundred bushes in full bloom creating a visual treat and an overload for the olfactory nerve. The Fuchsia, Perennial and Japanese gardens completed the tour.

The group exited Point Defiance Park via the 5 Mile Drive enjoying a glimpse of old growth forest and peek-a-boo views of the sound. A stop at Jungle Fever Garden Center let everyone enjoy the owners "exotic" plants and garden design.

A short drive took us north to Furney's Nursery to shop for some of the many plants we had enjoyed during the day. A beautiful sunny northwest day was the perfect backdrop to enjoy the 4th Annual Garden tour.

2016 Half Fast Lap of Washington

Our last day, September 19, we start with a good breakfast, then we wander to Tonasket, Omak, and then Loup Loup Pass, Twisp, and stop for lunch in Winthrop. Along the way, we'll get an education on Forest Fires! After lunch, we wander through the beautiful North Cascades Scenic Highway, Rockport, Darrington, Arlington, and back into the Seattle area. AROC National Convention - PreTour Wanderings

The Pre Convention Tour (PCT) before the AROC Nashville Convention departed from Cleveland, Tennessee, some 2-1/2 hours southeast of the Nashville Airport where we (Cindy Banzer, Doug Zaitz, and I) were to pick up our rental vehicle. Despite anticipated traffic from the Bonnaroo Music Festival, which was directly on our route, we arrived in time for the Driver's Meeting. This year's participants included about 25 cars (mostly Alfas) and 44 people, most of whom had participated in previous PCTs.

The first morning of the Tour we drove the twisty road along the Ocoee River into the Tennessee side of the Great Smoky (Appalachian) Mountains. The Ocoee was used for kayaking competition for the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. Interesting in that the flow of the river is controlled by releasing more or less water from upstream dams. Timing was such that we arrived at a viewing area moments before a substantial torrent of water (as well as kayakers and rafters) arrived. Then it was on to Ducktown, site of a former copper mine, the cleanup of which was one of the largest of EPA's Superfund endeavors. After lunch, we travelled primarily secondary (fun!) roads beside which were numerous advertisements for what I thought was a Pacific Northwest

phenomenon, "Sasquatch". We ended our drive for the day in Chattanooga.

Monday morning we were off to the Coker Tire Museum where we viewed the large and diverse collection of automobiles, trucks, race cars, motorcycles, and bicycles. We took the rest of the morning to travel the extremely twisty and tight road up Signal Mountain, having to wait for a couple of vehicles that encountered difficulties. Then it was off to lunch at, again a restaurant that had opened just for the PCT. The afternoon was filled with two activities I would have least expected in rural Southeastern Tennessee. (Mind you we were travelling through the Legislative District where one of the candidates was recently forced to remove a sign proclaiming, "Make America White Again!"). The first stop was at a small (~400 students) middle school in Whitwell. Eighteen years ago the eighth grade class started a project to memorialize children lost in the Holocaust. To do the story justice, please go to the website ... www.oneclipatatime.org. It is absolutely astounding!! On to another small town (Tracy City) where we were treated to High Tea! And then it was off to the overnight destination of Tullahoma.



Our Tuesday began with a guided tour of the Beechcraft (Airplane) Museum outside of Tullahoma and then continued on to Lynchburg for a HUGE (all you can eat) boardinghouse dinner and then a tour of Jack Daniel's distillery. After the distillery tour, some in our party took the direct route (I-24 or US-41A), but we opted to



stay on the PCT route which took us through towns with names like Wartrace (!) and Bell Buckle. This option was to prove fortuitous for Doug and I, as the Gimmick Rallye for the Convention (in which we placed 2nd) took us over some of the same roads.

Arriving on Wednesday, June 15, some people attended the annual AROC Board of Directors meeting to watch the official work being done by those who keep our club on the track and moving forward. Thanks, BoD, for doing this so I can play and enjoy the club with other club members. Another fun thing to do on Wednesday was to explore the host hotel, Marriott, or the general area, or enjoy a tour of the Bellissima display at the Frist Center for the Visual Arts.

Bellissima is a display that stays through October featuring the creativity and futuristic visions of great Italian designs from Bertone, Pininfarina, Zagato, Ghia, Touring, and others from 1945 through 1975. Walking into the wonderful and artistic Frist building you are immediately greeted by the three Alfa Romeo

B.A.T. cars from the 50s. Its nice to see crowds of people gawking in amazement at the cars we'd love no matter what. The rest of the display continues with Ferrari 250 GTO, Cisitalia 202 SC, Fiat 8V Supersonic, Alfa Romeo 6C2500, Ferrari Dino Prototipo, ATS 2500 GT, Maserati A6G 2000, Lamborghini



Miura S, and even the extreme Bertone designed Lancia Stratos HF Zero. There is never enough time for displays like this as I can enjoy the details on all these cars for hours.

Amazingly, another museum display was also very cool... though not car related. Titled: The Power of Pictures, Early Soviet Photography and Film. This display explored the relationship between art and politics, showing a historic period when artists were a primary tool for social change or control. Soon after the Russian Revolution in 1917, artists enjoyed using a relatively new medium, photography, to capture their



new changing society. Though initially encouraged freely to capture life, when Stalin solidified his control over the country in 1932, he changed the rules. Strict state controls, staged photo scenes, idealized socialist agendas were to be the photo subjects. It could be a simple death sentence for taking the wrong photos. The carefully crafted photos were used to manipulate the masses with imagery of societal achievements that never existed. This happens today with digital



masses with imagery of societal achievements that never existed. This happens today with digital manipulation of images on social media and print media... often a profit motive, or by our News media often times to gain ratings. Gone are the days you can trust the photo.

Wednesday evening had the convention goers heading to the wonderfully funky Lane Motor Museum. Owned by Jeff Lane, he collects and displays unique, often small cars of all types and styles. Some new Hondas, or
