


Sunrise viewpoint at Mt Rainier



President's Column



I have some Alfa news to report, and the next paragraph will tell why it may not be the latest. There was a Fiat Chrysler dealers meeting in Las Vegas where the Barracuda convertible and next Dodge Charger were previewed, interesting to us, as both are based on the new Giulia platform. At the same time, the FCA executives claimed that everything is going as planned for Alfa Romeo. After the production Giulia is introduced next spring, the SUV will follow, then the spider in 2017 and the coupe in 2018. Allegedly, five billion euros have been budgeted for Alfa Romeo, with two billion already spent on the Giulia. Another claim that is still standing is the 2018 sales goal for Alfa Romeo is 400,000 cars. As before, we shall see.

This is sort of an odd column, being written about a month before you are reading it. Judy and I will be gone for nearly all of September, regretfully missing the Half Fast Lap and all of the other car activities we usually attend. I don't remember the last HFL we did not attend. We even participated when we were teaching, even though we always had to leave the group on Sunday. According to our plans, this September 20, when some (many, I hope) of you will be on Highway 504, going to Coldwater Ridge on Mount St. Helens, we will be touring one of the best automobile collections in the world, the Musee National de l'Automobile Collection Schlumpf, in Mulhouse, France. Not only is it a fabulous collection, it has quite a story.

We were there fifteen years ago and were highly impressed with the 400+ vehicles on display as well as the museum itself. Past the memorial to the Schlumpf brothers' mother and the huge pipe organ, we entered a large hall where there were tiled walkways lined by copies of Paris streetlights as far as we could see. On fine gravel pads there were 123 Bugattis, including three Royales, although one is a bitsa.

The eight Alfa Romeos included three 8C2900s and a Disco Volante racer. There were many cars from the 1890s, I think as early as 1893. Along with the magnitude of the collection I was especially impressed with a grid of Grand Prix racers, including Type 35 Bugattis, Maserati 250Fs, Mercedes W125 and W154 among them. It was overwhelming and I may not even be able to take it all in with this visit.

The original collection was an obsession of Hans and Fritz Schlumpf. They began manufacturing textiles in 1935, made a lot of money, and started collecting cars in the 1950s. They believed that every Bugatti that had ever been made should be returned to the Alsace (the Bugatti factory, in Molsheim, was just up the road). They reportedly bought huge collections, sometimes with blank checks, just to get a few cars that they wanted. For instance, in 1962, they bought 50 Bugattis plus sent a form letter to all Bugatti owners offering to buy their cars. In 1963 they got eighteen of Bugatti's personal cars including his Royale. John Shakespeare, in Chicago, sold them thirty Bugattis and they were guite a sight, filling a train of open rail cars. The brothers ended up with 500+ cars and in 1964 started employing forty confidential employees to do restorations.

They were confidential, because the Schlumpf brothers wanted to keep the whole thing a secret. Their obsession, combined with most textile manufacturing moving to Asia, broke the company. In 1976 the workers went on strike and the next year, broke into the factory and discovered the collection. What a surprise! There was controversy as what to do with the cars, but only one was burned in protest, and the textile union finally opened the collection to the public. There were 800,000 visitors in two years, but it was still in danger. After the French government classed it as a "French Historical Monument," it was finally taken over by a consortium, which included the Automobile Club of France and the City of Mulhouse, in 1981. It went through some hard times until 2000, when it was finally reopened in its present state. Many cars, most of them racers, have been added, but sixty two of the originals were returned in 1999 to Fritz Schlumpf's widow and are presently in the Mullin Museum. Hopefully the turmoil is over, as it is now a National Heritage Site. As I said, it's quite a story, and a wonderful museum, certainly worthy of anyone's bucket list.


Alfa News



Its Your Turn To Make Your Mark!

We have a lot of great talent in our club membership, and now is the time to share yours. Club leadership elections are coming in one month. Elections, held on November 10th, will be for club officers: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. All positions are part of the Leadership Board along with volunteer positions for the Activities, Membership, Webmaster, and Newsletter Editor. Between now and then, if you like what the club does, enjoy the events and information, and the social aspects, then step up and do your small part to support the club. Here are outlines of the elected roles so you'll know what to volunteer for.

President: The easiest job on the Board. Controls the activities of the overall Board, runs the Board meetings, and presides over the club meetings. Writes a monthly column for the newsletter. Helps to find and fill openings in club com-

mittee spots. Typically uses around 4 hours monthly and requires only passion and some leaderships skills!

Vice President: Backs up the club President, arranges locations and speakers (if any) for monthly club meetings, and tracks attendance at monthly club meetings. Typically requires 2 to 3 hours per month and some organization and communication skills!

Secretary: Note taker for club and board meetings. Forwards the meeting notes to other board and committee members. Requires only organization and communication skills and around an hour per month!

Treasurer: This role keeps our club finances in line, tracks the money, pays the club bills, and follows good accounting practices. May need up to 4 or 5 hours monthly.

You can volunteer for Non-Elected positions: Activities, Membership, Webmaster, and Newsletter Editor. It's not unheard of for people to sign up as a team with another member. (Wife & husband? Friend & friend?)

Activities: Track all events on the calendar and minimize conflicts. The role requires social skills and some organization talent as well as an hour per month.

Membership: Welcome new members to the club with an e-mail or phone call, as well as provide info about the club to prospective members. Brag about the cool things we do as part of NWARC. Look for ways to attract new members and keep current ones. Requires a couple hours per month and good social skills.

Webmaster: Keeps information up to date on the website with the latest meeting info, and newsletter postings. Needs a couple hours per month and requires understanding basic web applications and programming.

Newsletter Editor: You need to gather stories and photos from people attending events, or "report" the event yourself. Pull together info about news, up-coming events, meetings, or any dirt you can find to put into the monthly digital and print newsletters. The requirements are some mild computer skills, reasonable communication, and about 16 hours per month... plus attendance at events. This could be done as a team like almost every other club newsletter.

You can get more specifics on each of these roles by contacting the current people using info found on page 3 of this newsletter. Each role is rather easy, fun to do, and there's opportunity for learning on the job, and most importantly, its a chance to take your turn as a leader in the best Alfa Romeo club around.

Back to School Time... Driver Skills School Nov 15




