On Wednesday January 11 Doug Zaitz, Dolly Samson and I were fully prepared to fly to Portland, meet AROC President Cindy Banzer and continue to Palm Springs to make some final advance preparations for what would prove to be a large gathering of Alfisti. We could not predict that Portland would be engulfed with 12"-18" of snow prior to our departure and that we would not be able to land. This we found out as the Uber driver took us to our 2:00 p.m. flight. When we arrived at SeaTac, we found that we would be re-routed through San Francisco and would be delayed some five hours before departure and then another hour in SFO. Our original arrival in Palm Springs was therefore pushed from 6:00 p.m. to nearly midnight.

Despite the delays we still had time on Thursday for Costco food runs, some socializing, and food preparations for the expected crowds of up to 75 people at the weekend events.

A pleasant surprise guest was our own Steve Schaeffer, who had managed his busy work schedule to include the weekend activities in the desert.

On Saturday, we met about 60 people in a great collection of Alfas and other vehicles, including a new Giulia QV (reputedly the first one sold in the U.S.) which Chris Shaler and his wife brought from Tucson. Doug, Cindy, Dolly and I had earlier planned a 180mile jaunt over the hills and down to Borrego Springs for the crowd. After lunch, many Alfisti toured Galleta Meadows where they viewed over 100 metal sculptures scattered throughout the desert. One, a gigantic serpent that arched over the sands and under the roadway was of particular interest to us "Cross and Serpent" fanatics. We all returned to Cindy's luxurious "Desert Lily" to enjoy food and drink on the patio and around the pool.

Sunday morning found the nine Directors in attendance on the monthly "Zoom" teleconference with the other Directors unable to make the trip, as well as with Alex Csank, chair of the



2017 Montreal Convention. Alfa News

A 1974 Alfa Romeo GTV 2000 was sold by Bonhams at The Scottsdale Auction on January 19 for the astonishing sum of \$83,600! It hadn't even been fully restored - the auction listing refers only to "much restoration work performed" - and keener eyes than mine noticed some non-standard items in the photos accompanying the description. It's a European-spec model with twin Dellorto carburettors and air conditioning. There must have been two very determined bidders in the room...





Alfa Romeo is now taking orders in the EMEA region for the First Edition of the new Stelvio SUV. The First Edition uses a 280 hp 2.0 litre turbo direct-injection gasoline engine with an 8-speed automatic transmission and Q4 all-wheel drive. Normally operating in rear-drive mode, the transmission can send up to 50% of the available torque to the front axle as needed. Alfa's first-ever SUV, which debuted with the high-performance Quadrifoglio version at the Los Angeles International Motor Show last November, the Stelvio is named after Italy's highest mountain pass and the road across it, which has over 75 hairpin turns in its 20 kilometre length.

The new Giulia Quadrifoglio has been getting rave reviews in the car magazines. *Road & Track's* Max Prince praised not only it's engine ("an absolute monster", "top-end wallop is simply a league beyond the 425-hp M3") but also its superb ride quality ("a level of compliance the current M3 can't match"). *Automobile's* Arthur St. Antoine called it "overflowing with character ... fast, melodious and thrilling on its feet...a driver's sports sedan through and through." I hope all that goodness translates well to the more affordable 4cylinder models when they become available; it all sounds very promising!

And Giulias can now be seen on our own roads, with Greg Whitten (who else?) taking home the first Seattle-area delivery, in Rosso Competizione.



2017 National Convention — Alfa Expo 17 — Montreal

I've just registered for the combined ARCC-AROC Convention in Montreal from July 10 through 16, 2017. The website (alfaclub.ca) is very intuitive and the registration process is really quite simple. Additionally, right now the ratio of the CAD\$ and the US\$ is very favorable (.74:1), so that should provide more incentive. The hotel rate is very reasonable, as are the costs of the usual events. Arizona Concours d'Elegance–January 13, 2017

Held in mid January, this event is younger than it appears, with a wonderful location on the grass at the beautiful Frank Lloyd Wrightinfluenced Arizona Biltmore resort between Phoenix and Scottsdale. Designed by Wright's pupil, Albert Chase McArthur, and finished in 1929, this amazing place utilizes "Biltmore Block" construction using Arizona sand and decorated with 34 different geometric patterns. It also happens to offer rather nice warm weather during our cold winters.

This year, Cindy Akana and I headed down to Arizona to attend the event on January 13. This event is only in its 4th year but it has the feel of a very mature event with how well it flows and the caliber of both guest speakers and the cars. It is really a well run, fun event, and it also serves as a fund raiser for Make-A-Wish Foundation.

I had already arranged for a 1951 Ferrari 212 MM Vignale Berlinetta to be transported down to Arizona for exhibit, and it arrived just prior to my arrival. My job was to help prepare the car, then show it for the judges of the Vignale-bodied cars class, and then take it on a short drive on Monday with many of the other display cars. Tough job, but someone has to do it.

Arriving in the evening, checking in and wandering to our room we were pleasantly surprised to find our room looked straight out onto the lawn where the show, and my car class, would be displayed. Someone gave us a great tip, which I'll share with all of you; when in the Phoenix area one of the best dinner choices is Tarbell's. Their philosophy is "Simple, Fresh, Fun" and the Iron Chef-winning owner, Mark Tarbell, hits and exceeds the target. Oh my.

During the evening banquet they asked the crowd to donate to Make-A-Wish Foundation, and in 15 minutes, they raised \$110,000 for the cause.

Sunday was a nice overcast, short shirtsleeve kind of day. The show was amazing with around 100 extremely nice cars, including one Alfa Romeo, a 1961 Giulietta Sprint Speciale owned by Bay area resident and passionate car guy, Joe Hurwich. The crowds were wonderful and there were lots of interesting conversations amongst the cars. Judging found the Ferrari I was showing to be 2nd place in Class. Best in Show went to a 1936 Bugatti Type 57SC Atlantic owned by the leading Bugatti expert, Peter Mullin. It's almost impossible to imagine beating that stunning car in any competition.

Monday was sunshine as we headed out for the scenic 90 mile drive. The drive took us to a stop at the 'home' of a private car collector. Once there, we realized that this facility, complete with a beautiful garage holding around 40 cars on display, a separate working *continued on p7*

"Hoods Up" at Alfa Romeo's Museo Storico

Wandering through the many automobile museums of the world can be a frustrating experience due to the one thing they often have in common; the hoods are usually closed, and, if not, one can't get close enough to study the mechanicals. This is a shame given that unlike today's plastic-covered engines, many 20th



century powerplants were wonderful examples of the engineer's art, awesome to look at and designed to be easy to work on.

Alfa Romeo is one of

the few firms left with a lengthy and glorious history of designing advanced engines. Engines are the essence of Alfa Romeo, and the Museo Storico Alfa Romeo is not afraid to show it. On December 18 2016, the Museum in Arese celebrated its 40-Year Anniversary with a special exhibition in which the hoods were open on about 300 cars for everyone to see and touch. And why not? Engines are the sporting heart of Alfa Romeo;

for years Alfa created only the chassis and engine, while the coachwork was completed by others such as Pininfarina, Zagato, and Bertone. Therefore, the 'real essence' of historic Alfas often lies beneath the



coachwork. The Museo Storico Alfa Romeo first opened on December 18th 1976. It was closed to the public for a complete renovation project by architect Benedetto Camerana, and reopened its doors in the form of the futuristic "Time Machine" building on 24 June 2015. 🙀

Board Meeting

NWARC Board Meeting January 24, 2017

On Tuesday, January 24, your local Board met for over three hours to follow-up on the very productive general meeting held two weeks previous. In attendance were Fred Russell, Ken Case, Gordy Hyde, Mirko Freguia, Judy and Bill Gehring, and Jon Inge. Other members were unable to attend due to either the short notice or work.

Fred had prepared an agenda requiring updates and other contributions from each of the officers. First up was reiteration of and plans for the upcoming monthly meetings.

Mirko led a good discussion about potential dates for two Driver's Skills Training events to be held at Pacific Raceways. Friday, March 17 was selected as the best date for the Spring school and Saturday, November 19 is the likely date for the Fall event.

Gordy updated the Board regarding plans to attend the 2017 Convention in Montreal as well as planning progress for the 2018 Convention. These topics were followed by a lengthy discussion about needed revisions to the existing NWARC By-laws, which have not been amended or updated for over thirty years. Primary amongst the proposed revisions are removal of gender specificity, correction of scrivener's errors, and inclusion of technology advancements. Please look for announcements of adoption of the amendments in upcoming issues of '*Iniezione'*.

A lengthy presentation was made by Ken Case, your newly elected Treasurer. Ken has spent many hours auditing the records and ensuring they are up to date. He announced, as we all knew, that the chapter is financially solvent. Some of the work Ken has been doing is investigative, looking into comparative costs and options for the chapter to accept credit cards and other forms of payment for events as well as being able to make payments for expenses via credit card. He is also helping to generate newsletter ad revenue through creation of current billings.

Fred introduced the topic of a new member handout to be printed or sent digitally to new members. This would likely include lists of previous events, officers and contact information, directions on creating an event, and local suppliers, vendors and sources for repair work on our Alfas. He also proposed we print and laminate name tags hung on lanyards which would include club tenure, as well as help all members see the names of fellow members.

Jon Inge, new editor of '*Iniezione'*, spoke about the need to have articles written by others and announced that he intends to resume publication of a 12-page newsletter. Kudos to Jon for taking on this daunting task!

Also discussed was the website, the blogsite, event recording and reporting. We even managed to eat some of the pizza, cookies, and other snacks that Fred so generously provided! - *Gordy*
